Rebuild the House of the Lord

A sermon preached by Ted Atkinson, Minister, Oxford Presbyterian Church, Oxford, PA on September 13, 1992, the 14th Sunday after Pentecost. Scripture Lessons: Ezra 1; 2 Corinthians 5:1; Mark 13:1-8.

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER AND OF THE SON AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

After the fire that destroyed our church I turned in every direction for help as to how to proceed. I called the national headquarters of our church in Louisville, Kentucy. I called the Synod and the Presbytery. But no one seemed to know what to do when a church burns down. Finally, I turned to the Bible and remembered the story of what God's people once did after their temple was destroyed. The story is found in Drent Duill be preaching ... encornage yento tread the Old Testament books of Ezra and Nehemiah. PEzra tells the story of how God stirred up the spirits of God's people to rebuild the Temple which had been destroyed. in later chapters Ezra goes on to show how, in the process of rebuilding, God rebuilt, renewed, and The relationship of his people to himself, revived God's people. The book of Nehemiah goes on to show that God's concern was not only for the Temple and the renewal of faith of his pecale. His concern was for the renaisance of the whole city of Jerusalem. I believe that God is stirring the hearts of his people hear in Oxford to rebuild the Oxford Presbytery Church. And it's exciting to think that, through this process of rebuilding, we will be rebuilt and reformed and revived as God's people after many years of disappointment and deferred hope. And It 's exciting to think that, perhaps, God wants us to lead the way, not only in rebuilding our church, but in rebuilding and reviving the whole town of Oxford in every area of its life; in the areas of business, and justice and education, economics and family life.

We aren't the only ones who've had to rebuild a church after a fire. I take heart from the story of the rebuilding of the temple which is found in the 81d

Testament book of Ezra. There are amazing parallels between what we've gone through these past 3 years and what happened to the people of God 2,500 years ago.

1. Both Solomon's Temple and our church were destroyed and reduced to rubble. Just as God preserved his people despite the destruction of the Temple, God has preserved us despite the loss of our Church.

In the Old Testament people of God became exiles from their land and house of worship for about 70 years. During their many years of exile the People of God discovered that God could be worshipped and served without the Temple. Many ancient people once conquered, lost their religion and identity, but God's Old Testament people maintained their identity and faith. They not only maintained their identity, they grew in their understanding of who God is and what God requires of us.

We also have been exiled from our land and building, although for only three years. Despite the loss of our beautiful church building, God has preserved and strengthened our identity and sense of purpose. For example, shortly after the fire, the Building Planning Committee visited churches that had burned and rebuilt. All of them suffered a loss of membership and a reduction in their worship attendance. But God has blessed us. Two years before the fire our average attendance was about 150 a week. Our average attendance after the fire has been about 175 a week and I believe and am trusting God to take us over the 200 a week threshold when we get back into our church. Before the fire our high school Sunday School class was lucky to have two or three kids. We began the Fall Sunday School season with 15 high school kids. Several weeks ago I was thrilled when two high school kids stood up and

gave a brief testimony as to how their relationship to the Risen Christ has been strengthened. It's wonderful what God has done for us since we've been exiled from our land and house of worship.

- A. Not all of God's people returned from the Babylonian Exile to Jerusalem but only those whose spirit God had stirred got ready to go up and rebuild the house of the LORD. Not all of our members have stayed with us. Most have and we've even added new members. But some members have left. We shouldn't disparage those who haven't stayed with us to rebuild the House of the Lord. May God bless them and enable them to grow spiritually and serve the Lord to the fullest capacity. But, praise the Lord, God has stirred your hearts to respond to the great and once in a life-time challenge to rebuild our House of the Lord in Oxford.
- 3. The Old Testament people of God faced opposition and discouragement in their attempt to rebuild the Temple. They laid the foundation of the temple but then had to postpone the building of the rest of it for years and years. Long years went by when nothing seemed to be happening.

We've also faced discouragement and delays in rebuilding of the church. From May of 1989 to September of 1990 the ruins stood and nothing seemed to be happening. Then the walls were leveled and the rubble removed. It looked like something was finally happening. But then we waited for another year before the foundation was laid and the walls began to rise. We hope to get into our rebuilt church by January but it may be years before the work is completed. But in spite of discouragement and delays, God has stirred our hearts to rebuild the House of the Lord.

A: There's another parallel between those who rebuilt the Old Testament
Temple and we who are rebuilding the Oxford Presbyterian Church. Both they and us
have enjoyed the financial support of the community beyond our own membership.
"All their neighbors aided them with silver vessels, with gold, with goods, with
animals, and with valuable gifts..." Surely, God stirred the spirits of his people in
Babylon to return and build the house of the Lord when their neighbors contributed so
much towards the rebuilding.

What an encouragement it has been to me to receive gifts from our neighbors; to hear people like Carl Fretz express his concern that our church be rebuilt. The people of this town want our church rebuilt almost as badly as we do. Many people who aren't affiliated with our church believe that our church standing and ministering in the middle of the town is essential to the identity and spiritual life of Oxford.

We've received gifts from nearly every state in the union. We've received gifts from other countries. We've received gifts from churches, near and far, from service orgainizations, from young people who have given away their baby sitting money. God has stirred up the spirits of many people and organizations to rebuild the House of the Lord.

Why? Because God has given us a vision. God has given us a vision of a church that transforms the culture and town. God has given us a vision of a church which believes that God's word has application to every area of life: to politics and economics and social issues. God has stirred our spirits with a vision of a church that's for the whole community, and not for just ourselves and for people just like

us; for the poor and the rich; for the old and the young; for the handicapped and the spry; for the liberal and the conservative; the strong in faith and for the doubting.

Surely he Lord God whom we've come to know in Jesus Christ has stirred the hearts of many of us to rebuild the House of the Lord.

5. There's still another parallel. Many things were saved from Solomon's Temple before its destruction; silver and gold basins; silver bowls and many other kinds of vessels. They were saved and taken to Babylon where they were placed in the house of Nebuchadnezzar's gods. King Cyrus of Persia had them released so they could be brought back to Jerusalem and to the rebuilt temple.

We also saved many things out of the church. We saved the communion service.

We saved the bells. We saved many chairs and some furniture which the youth group has cleaned up. We saved the bell tower. We saved some iron pillars which are being used in the new church. The stone circle which was on the facade of the old church was saved and will be incorporated in the new one. These old things provide continuity with the past and remind us of how God has delivered us, like Shadrach, Meshech and Abednego, from the fiery furnace and, like Jonah, God has delivered us from the belly of the whale that threatened to swallow us up and destroy us. I am John word to bronger the past had been to our cloud brolem?

One final thing which I don't know yet whether it's a parallel or not.

Solomon's temple lasted nearly 400 years before it was destroyed. The Temple which the returned exiles rebuilt lasted for about 500 years, or a hundred years longer. It was this rebuilt temple that was graced with the presence of the Lord Jesus Christ, first as a little child whose parents brought him to the temple for his dedication; and later, as a man he came to cleanse the temple.

Our neo-gothic church was completed in 1864. It burned down 125 years later. May our rebuilt church last 200 - 300 years or more, and may we be blessed with many visitations of the Lord Jesus Christ in the person of the Holy Spirit.

The story that Ezra tells has become our story. everything to happan us toutly ...

Proy that God will continue to stir the spirit of God's people to give freewill offerings to rebuild the church. God has certainly been stirring my heart to rebuild as I've talked to people in the community, with fellow pastors, and with people from out of town who have all been praying for us and often giving to us. God has stirred my spirit, especially, with some of the letters we've received. One first grader wrote a note to Dave and Beth Keefer which Dave shared with me, "Dear Mr. and Mrs. Keefer, I am sorry about your church. I know how much you liked your church. I liked the church, too. I hape that the people build a new church... Love, Michael Maxwell."

And little Ramon Aguilar wrote, "The church in Oxford burned down. I saw the fire.... It was a very big fire.... The organ burned, all the stained glass windows, and the piano. The people are going to fix the church. They are going to build it again."

Let us pray: "O Lord... stir up the spirit of your people to rebuild the church."

May that be the continual prayer of all of us.

1000 BC

Foundation of the city of Rome

587 BC

Nebuchadnezzar II of Babylonian Empire conquers the kingdom of Judea, burns and demolishes the Temple in Jerusalem, brings the monarchy to an end, and deports many Jews into captivity in Babylon (The Babylonian Captivity lasts, roughly, 70 years). The people of God cease to be a political kingdom and begin to-become a "church"

553 BC

Cyrus II, the Great, of Persia (553-529) conquers Lydia, the Medes, and the Babylonian Empire. In 536 BC he frees Jews from the Babylonian Captivity and aids their return to Israel.

538 BC

The rebuilding of the Temple of Jerusalem begins under the leadership of Zerubbabel (538 BC - 516 BC). It takes over 20 years to complete the Temple

Ca 458 BC

Exra comes to Jerusalem to rebuild the people through teaching and enforcing the Law of God.

Ca 445 BC

Nehemiah comes to Jerusalem to rebuild the valls of Jerusalem

356 BC

Alexander the Great born

100 BC

Julius Caesar born

The Birth, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus

AD 70

The Jerusalem Temple burned and demolished due to Jewish revolt

against Roman rule. The Temple has never been rebuilt.
